#### INTRODUCTION

The Annual Synar Report (ASR) format provides the means for states to comply with the reporting provisions of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 300x-26) and the Tobacco Regulation for the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant (SABG) (45 C.F.R. 96.130 (e)).

#### How the Synar report helps the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention

In accordance with the tobacco regulations, states are required to provide detailed information on progress made in enforcing youth tobacco access laws (FFY 2019 Compliance Progress) and future plans to ensure compliance with the Synar requirements to reduce youth tobacco access rates (FFY 2020 Intended Use Plan). These data are required by 42 U.S.C. 300x-26 and will be used by the Secretary to evaluate state compliance with the statute. Part of the mission of the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP) is to assist states by supporting Synar activities and providing technical assistance helpful in determining the type of enforcement measures and control strategies that are most effective. This information is helpful to CSAP in improving technical assistance resources and expertise on enforcement efforts and tobacco control program support activities, including state Synar program support services, through an enhanced technical assistance program involving conferences and workshops, development of training materials and guidance documents, and onsite technical assistance consultation.

#### How the Synar report can help states

The information gathered for the Synar report can help states describe and analyze substate needs for program enhancements. These data can also be used to report to the state legislature and other state and local organizations on progress made to date in enforcing youth tobacco access laws when aggregated statistical data from state Synar reports can demonstrate to the Secretary the national progress in reducing youth tobacco access problems. This information will also provide Congress with a better understanding of state progress in implementing Synar, including state difficulties and successes in enforcing retailer compliance with youth tobacco access laws.

#### Where and when to submit the Synar report

The ASR must be received by SAMHSA no later than December 31, 2020 and must be submitted in the format specified by these instructions. Use of the approved format will avoid delays in the review and approval process. The chief executive officer (or an authorized designee) of the applicant organization must sign page one of the ASR certifying that the state has complied with all reporting requirements.

The state must upload one copy of the ASR using the online WebBGAS (Block Grant Application System). In addition, the following items must be uploaded to WebBGAS:

- FFY 2021 Synar Survey Results: States that use the Synar Survey Estimation System (SSES) must upload one copy of SSES Tables 1–8 (in Excel) to WebBGAS. Please note that, beginning with the FFY 2019 ASR, SSES will generate Tables 6, 7, and 8, which are based on the optional microdata on product type, retail outlet type, and whether identification was requested. If your state does not submit these optional data, Tables 6, 7, and 8 will be blank. Tables 6, 7, and 8 are generated for the convenience of the state, and states are not required to submit completed versions of Tables 6, 7, or 8. States that do not use SSES must upload one copy of ASR Forms 1, 4, and 5, and Forms 2 and 3, if applicable, (in Excel), as well as a database with the raw inspection data to WebBGAS.
- Synar Inspection Form: States must upload one blank copy of the inspection form used to record the result of each Synar inspection.
- Synar Inspection Protocol: States must upload a copy of the protocol used to train inspection teams on conducting and reporting the results of the Synar inspections. This document should be different than the Appendix C attached to the Annual Synar Report.

	Merchant education and/or training

The Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services and the Kansas Department of Revenue collaboratively established the Cigarette and Tobacco Enforcement (CATE) Team devoted to tobacco compliance and enforcement. The CATE Team is comprised of nine field inspectors, who provide statewide coverage of all 105 Kansas counties, and a staff attorney and an administrative assistant, who assist with the prosecution of the issued citations, including the administrative hearing process which may result in fines and/or suspension or revocation of the license, collect and track some of the relevant data needed to show compliance, and perform other duties that support the field staff and help carry out the mission of CATE and enforcement of the cigarette and tobacco laws.

From October 1, 2019 to September 30, 2020, the CATE Team completed 1,374 retailer inspection visits.

CATE conducts a minimum of one controlled buy enforcement visit at all licensed retail locations that are youth accessible. They also target enforcement revisits in locations that have failed previous enforcement visits from either Synar or CATE. Revisits consist of performing an inspection, including checking for the posting of the State issued license, verifying that the required posting of signage that states that the retail dealer does not sell to persons under 18 years of age. In addition, the following are completed during a revisit: random check of cigarette packages for the State's tax stamp; confirming that the brands sold are listed on the Kansas Attorney General's directories of approved brands permitted to be sold in the state; asking the retail dealer if they retain three years of invoices on the premises; and address any questions that staff may have. CATE inspectors provide education and information to discuss the techniques to verify age when a Kansas driver's license is presented. Sample driver's licenses are shown and discussed with available staff, noting the slogan, "vertical and green, not 18," as an age verification identifier of the Kansas driver's license.

CATE inspectors conduct educational visits as well as inspections. On an education visit, licensees may be given a written warning for any violations found, whereas at the actual inspection, and licensees may be issued a written citation for the violations. The inspector will have an employee or manager, if available, sign the checklist and leave a business card for the licensee to call for further retailer training or questions they may have later.

Inspectors also note that the CATE Team will be periodically performing inspections to curb sales of tobacco to minors by sending an underage youth into the establishment to attempt to purchase cigarettes.
CATE maintains a database with updates from the enforcement activities; provides timely information upon request from KDADS to assist with the monitoring, evaluating, planning, and data collecting of the Synar effort.

#### Synar protocol and data collection training

The lead Cigarette Tobacco Manager together with the lead Synar analyst contracted by KDADS, presented a Synar protocol refresher course to all CATE inspectors in the state on April 20, 2020. The purpose of the training was to ensure that all inspectors conducting the Synar inspections were fully informed of proper protocol and procedures.

#### Supplemental Synar Analysis Report

After the Synar cycle each year, a report is developed to further analyze violations. A 'hot spot' map is created to help determine areas where additional education visits might be needed. The report also analyzes violations in relation to clerk and UCI gender and age whether age was asked, and ID was checked.

All adults working with minors are KDOR commissioned inspectors. The inspectors are recruited through the State Department of Administration website and other state and local resources. They are selected through the standard interview process. All inspectors have a background check completed as part of the hiring process. Training for the inspectors is a 1-2-month process and includes training at the KDOR office for a week followed by a week of on-site field supervision. Additionally, inspectors spend at least two weeks with other inspectors with supervisory follow-up in specific areas as needed.

#### 5b. Describe the methods used to recruit, select, and train youth inspectors.

Youth are recruited from various sources throughout communities in the state, such as local substance abuse coalitions, health departments, schools and home-schooled youth. They are contacted by KDOR to schedule a meeting with them and their parents to explain the process, expectations and safeguards for the minors. If they are still interested, a background check is conducted to ensure that the youth do not have criminal record. Community members (law enforcement, teacher, etc.) are interviewed to ensure the youth are of good character. Applications are reviewed and approved by inspectors and a panel of KDOR administration. KDOR inspectors train all youth on inspection protocol and safety issues.

#### CIGARETTE & TOBACCO COVID-19 RISK MITIGATION PLAN

This plan will serve as a guide for the Cigarette & Tobacco team to begin conducting inspections and controlled buys. Should the health situation in the state of Kansas change, this document may no longer be valid.

#### **TRAINING**

Prior to conducting inspections or controlled buys, inspectors shall attend a refresher training. This training may be done in person or virtually, at the discretion of management.

Prior to conducting controlled buys, minors shall be given a refresher training. The results of the training shall be sent to the office for record keeping purposes.

#### PERSONAL PROTECTION EQUIPMENT

Inspectors will be issued facemasks and gloves. Inspectors and minors shall wear a new mask each day or change it sooner if the mask should become contaminated/dirty.

Inspectors and minors should practice social distancing whenever possible.

#### PRIOR TO LEAVING HOME

Prior to leaving their home, inspectors should take their temperature and ask themselves the following questions: 1. Have I been in close contact with someone who has been diagnosed with or is suspected to have COVID-19 within the last 14 days? 2. Am I experiencing two or more of the following symptoms?

- Fever
- Chills
- Stiffness/Rigidity
- Muscle aches or pains
- Fatigue/Weakness
- Headache
- Sore throat

- Cough
- Shortness of breath/Difficulty breathing
- Sudden loss of taste or smell
- Vomiting
- Diarrhea
- Stomach or abdominal pain

Prior to allowing the minor into the vehicle, the inspector should ask the minor the following questions: 1. Have you been in close contact with someone who has been diagnosed with or is suspected to have COVID-19 within the last 14 days? 2. Are you experiencing two or more of the following symptoms?

- Fever
- Chills

- Stiffness/Rigidity
- Muscle aches or pains

- Fatigue/Weakness
- Headache
- Sore throat
- Cough
- Shortness of breath/Difficulty breathing

- Sudden loss of taste or smell
- Vomiting
- Diarrhea
- Stomach or abdominal pain

If the answer is yes to question 1 or two or more of the symptoms or if the employee has a temperature that is 100 or higher, the employee cannot work and personnel services will need to be informed immediately.

#### **INSPECTIONS**

Inspections may be conducted beginning May 25, 2020, unless otherwise directed by management. Inspectors shall wear gloves while conducting inspections and will dispose of the used gloves after each inspection. At no time should the inspector wear the same gloves at multiple locations. Avoid allowing the clerk/manager the use of your pen or to touch your clipboard during an inspection. Your clipboard and pen should be wiped down with disposable wipes after an inspection prior to putting it in your vehicle.

#### CONTROLLED BUYS

Controlled buys may be conducted beginning July 1, 2020, unless otherwise directed by management. Controlled buys will be conducted by one inspector and one minor, except for training purposes. The inspector and minor will wear masks at all times, including in the vehicle traveling to, from and between attempts. The minor will sit in the back seat on the passenger side of the vehicle or where the greatest distance can be achieved between the inspector and minor.

If a sale occurs, the inspector will wear gloves while in the retail location. Avoid allowing the clerk/manager the use of your pen or to touch your clipboard while gathering information and signatures. The clipboard and pen used should be wiped down with disposable wipes after leaving the building, prior to putting it in your vehicle.

The minor should wear gloves during a buy attempt or use hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol after a buy. If the minor's driver's license is handled by a clerk during an attempt, the license should be wiped down once the minor returns to the vehicle.

#### VEHICLE MAINTENANCE

The inspector will wipe down the inside of the vehicle at the end of each day's use with disinfectant spray or disposable wipes. Taking care to wipe areas where the inspector and/or minor were located. The inspector will avoid using the recirculated air option for the vehicle's ventilation system.
